TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The Trustees present their Annual Report together with the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The North Northumberland Hospice operating as HospiceCare North Northumberland (The Hospice) is the local charity supporting people living with life limiting illnesses. The Hospice is a charitable company limited by guarantee, company number 04925753 and is a registered charity, number 1103635 (England and Wales) incorporated in 2003.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Hospice's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Objectives and activities

Founded in 1995, the Hospice provides palliative care to people who have life limiting illnesses. We address their physical, emotional, social and psychological needs, enhancing their quality of life while at the same time supporting their carers and families.

The Hospice objects are:

- The care and relief of persons suffering from potentially life-limiting illness, the support of carers and
 of the bereaved, all in such ways as the Trustees shall from time to time think fit, and primarily in
 North Northumberland.
- The provision in the interest of social welfare of recreational facilities for such persons.

The Hospice operates from two sites, Alnwick and Berwick-upon-Tweed, to accommodate the large rural and sparsely populated area of North Northumberland. Patient choice and their individual needs determine where the North Northumberland Hospice services are delivered, whether it is at home or in the Hospice building. The Hospice adopts a holistic approach to patients and families, offering services and interventions of care and support which are flexible and tailored to meeting their needs.

We are caring, we pursue excellence, we innovate, we collaborate, we communicate, and we adopt a can-do attitude. We are the North Northumberland Hospice.

Policies to achieve our aims

The trustees regularly review our objectives, aims and activities, looking at the number of people we reach, the type and extent of services we provide, and the benefits we bring to our patients and their families. Palliative care is a continually developing field and we respond by developing our services to achieve the best possible outcome in each patient's circumstances. We have considered the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims.

Trustee review of our achievements and performance

What we do

We provide holistic end of life care

We employ senior nurses, and healthcare assistants, with a high level of relevant skills and experience in palliative and end-of-life care to provide comprehensive holistic assessment, reviews and care plans for those receiving our Hospice at Home service. We provide our bereavement support service to ensure we were able to meet the needs of those who may be suffering anticipatory grief as well as bereavement. We offer this in a group format or as an individual appointment depending on a person's individual needs. The wellbeing services are designed to support a person to live as well as they can for as long as they can; beyond this our care and support extends to family, friends and carers.

We are here when you need us

Our vital services are free of charge for all those who access them. Our Hospice at Home delivers care, day or night, 365 days a year in a person's usual place of residence. Alongside this we offer care and support in our Wellbeing Centres at Greensfield House in Alnwick and Hazel Marsden House in Berwick.

Who supports us?

Our staff

We have a dedicated and resilient workforce. Each member of the team works together to ensure that they focus on our patients and their families, friends and carers.

Our volunteers

Our volunteers outweigh our staff 4 to 1 and now stand at over 200 strong. They provide an estimated over £310,000 in donated time to the Hospice. Working in every area from retail to care support, they bring unique and varied skills to our organisation. Beyond this they give the organisation its beating heart in the community. In this year we had a volunteer recruitment drive to support our developing wellbeing services, drop in café and the growing support needs. The overwhelming response was much appreciated and saw the recruitment of a range of new skilled volunteers. All our volunteers are given organisational and role specific training.

Our donors

We need to raise in the region of £800,000 to provide the current level of care in our community, of which, to date, only a small proportion is provided by our annual service level agreement with Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust. We are therefore reliant on our donors in the community. We are able to strengthen and develop to meet the needs of our local community with the continued and essential support we receive from our donors.

What have we done?

In 2019/2020 we saw the recruitment of our Chief Executive. With this appointment we herald a year of rapid development for the North Northumberland Hospice. During this year:

- We relocated from Castleside House to Greensfield House, Alnwick. Greensfield House provided a
 purpose designed and fully accessible building to launch our new range of wellbeing services. This is
 in addition to our successful wellbeing site, Hazel Marsden House, in Berwick.
- The Hospice at Home team provided over 9,000 hours of support to people at the end of life.
 Supporting them to die at home, where they would like to be. To support this care we underwent a recruitment process to bring in new health care assistants to support the changing and growing needs of the organisation.
- Wellbeing services provided care to over 150 people, with over 1,000 hours of care provided. Our
 new programme of wellbeing services included a carer support group 'The Willows, Dementia support
 cafes led by our Admiral nurse, Bereavement support cafes, Drop-Ins and Information Hubs as well
 as 'Meet up Mondays'to offer an introductory session to those wanting to develop a new skill.
- The HUB services began in Berwick, bringing together the NHS and the Citizens Advise Bureau which provided practical, financial and legal guidance to patients and their families, friends and carers.
- We had our first Death Café, which brought together a range of individuals to talk about death and dying. The uplifting event saw people able to share their thoughts, feelings and questions about death.
- We developed a new brand and range of promotional literature to support us to deliver better communication.
- We developed a new range of supportive literature designed to inform our patients and their families, friends and carers of our services and how we can support them.
- We undertook a comprehensive governance review to ensure that we continue to provide safe, caring, effective, responsive and well led care services to our communities.
- We continued to innovate our dementia service services. Working in partnership with Newcastle
 United Football Community Foundation we provided dementia support services using football skills
 and weaving in time for listening services. The games took place in Alnwick and Berwick and provides
 wonderful benefits to the local community living with dementia. This service supports a growing body
 of evidence around sport used to promote improved quality of life for those living with dementia.

How have we achieved this?

To achieve all the work we have done brought together our support networks of staff, volunteer and donors. We have worked on various strands of work over the past year including:

- A review of our vision and values looking at the number of people we reach, the type and extent of
 services we provide, and the benefits we bring to our patients and their families. Palliative care is a
 continually developing field and we respond by developing our services to achieve the best possible
 outcome in each patient's circumstances. We worked closely with the trustees this year to create a
 new strategy to support our communities into the coming years.
- The fundraising team embarked on a new set of events which saw a growth in our income to support
 with new services. This was particularly highlighted by entering our 25th anniversary year, with a
 commemorative bespoke bottle of gin created.
- The retail team worked to embed our retail shops in Amble, Wooler and Berwick and we had an alltime high on income achieved. This income would not have been realised without the dedication of our staff and experienced volunteers enabling us to open six days per week.
- Recognising the changing world of income generation and the new challenges we wanted to meet
 within our strategy we decided to diversify our income streams and bring new skills to the
 organisation. In particular, we focussed on project driven trust applications to implement new
 services, such as our dementia services and expanded our portfolio of events based fundraising.

 We invested in our infrastructure with the appointment of a central support manager to bring together all the key support to enable us to continue to deliver our services. These involve HR, training, recruitment, health and safety and governance.

 We worked together with our neighbouring hospices in the North East, engaging in the North East Collaborative. Various groups meet to discuss governance, management and fundraising with a view to bringing together the collective hospice knowledge.

Summary of Trustees'review

The trustees wish to recognise the development and progress made at the Hospice. The trustees wish to record their enormous gratitude to the resilience, loyalty and hard work given so willingly by our entire team (staff and volunteers), and in particular to the senior management team who have met every challenge and without whom quite simply we could not have continued to function.

Through this year a number of trustees retired, and a new Chair took post. The board continued to develop strategy and oversee governance. In particular, the trustees recognised the need for a deeper awareness of governance and gaps in organisational structure. A Chief Executive was appointed for this experience and knowledge of the Care Quality Commission processes and procedures. Following a year of clinical governance development, the trustees accepted the resignation of the Chief Executive allowing the organisation to move forwards to its next phase of development.

Financial review

We once again achieved positive financial results for the year, posting net incoming resources (surplus) of £19,667. While less than the £67,151 generated in the previous year, this is still healthy, particularly considering the costs of moving premises.

Total income, at £818,603 was about 6% higher than in 2018/19. Income generated by community fundraising, donations and sponsored events of £242,097 was marginally higher than in 2018/19, and constituted 30% of total income. Trading activities yielded £360,664, 20% higher than in 2018/19, and 44% total income. The increase was mainly driven by a high value prize draw, and the opening of a third charity shop. These results reflect the commitment and dedication of our fundraising team, supported by our marketing and wider Hospice teams, together with our community and volunteers to boost the profile and reputation of the Hospice. We have also benefited from a continued growth in business partnership working and the support of regular donors.

Grants from trusts and foundations realised £75,306 for the year. This was £65,844 lower than the previous year, when substantial funding was received for a 2-year project, but nevertheless an important source of income. Of the total, £39,906 was restricted funding, primarily for the Hospice at Home and dementia service. At 9% of total income this is another satisfactory result for the small dedicated team of volunteers who work exclusively on trust applications.

Legacy income remains an intermittent stream for us, with £46,062 received against £17,000 in 2018/19, representing 6% of income.

The NHS Trust contract value of £40,952 was boosted by an additional £20,197, a share of the additional hospice funding provided by central government in August 2019. However, this statutory funding still only accounted for around 7% of our total income in 2018/19, considerably lower than the 25% to 30% statutory funding level that most hospices enjoy. Income from personal health budgets was £1,564. The Hospice agreed strategically to move away from personal health budgets as they have not been developed nationally as a reliable income stream. Additional direct charitable funding for a part-time Admiral Nurse post of £15,428 was received from Dementia UK, 2% total income.

So, we continue to maintain a healthy and resilient diversified funding mix, enabling us to consistently achieve positive results. We nevertheless work continuously on the long term sustainability of our funding sources, through increased regular giving, further development of partnerships with local businesses, and a longer term project to stimulate legacies.

Total resources expended of £798,936 were higher than the previous year as we continued to expand our work. Expenditure on charitable activities increased by 10% as a result of increased activities through the year, the development of new services including our Dementia Football. The provision of a third retail shop increased fundraising costs by 16%, however we expect this to be more than repaid in boosting future income.

The charity's total funds increased from £712,807 to £732,475 at 31 March 2020, of which £617,634 was unrestricted.

Post balance sheet events and the way forward

COVID 19 was an unexpected and difficult time for the country. For the North Northumberland Hospice our Chief Executive resigned and we have recruited a new Chief Executive.

The North Northumberland Hospice continued to provide our care in a collaborative way. More specifically, we have entered into a working agreement to provide clinical services to the 'Well Up North' Primary Care Network. This has allowed the North Northumberland Hospice to work more closely with local health structure, and has supported us as we navigated our response to COVID 19.

We provided more care, to more people while maintaining a good financial footing with the support of our community. As we continue to work within government guidance, we will review our strategy in light of COVID 19 and start to redesign our services.

Reserves Policy

The positive operating result for the year increased our free reserves (unrestricted funds, excluding tangible fixed assets) by 3% to £470,174. The reserves policy is reviewed annually, and it was decided to continue for 2019/20 with a target range for free reserves of between six and nine months of operating expenditure. At 31 March 2020 the reserves were within the target range, representing approximately seven months of projected expenditure. The trustees, through the Finance committee, continuously monitor the liquidity and reserves position to ensure we remain in line with the policy.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Hospice is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

The Hospice takes specialist advice, when required, from Human Resources, Health & Safety and risk management consultants. The management and trustees have had a Major Risk Register in place for some years, covering all areas of activity. Individual aspects of risk are periodically reviewed at Board meetings.

Structure, governance and management

The Hospice is a charitable company limited by guarantee, company number 04925753 and is a registered charity, number 1103635 (England and Wales) incorporated on 8 October 2003. Following a rebranding in March 2008, the Hospice is known for trading purposes only as The North Northumberland Hospice but this does not affect either its charity or company registrations. The charitable company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the charitable company being wound up, members (the only class of which at present are current trustees and the company secretary) are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law.

Trustee Induction and Training

New trustees are invited to meet with the Chairperson and then a wider group of trustees prior to appointment, in order to gain an overall understanding of the day-to-day work of the Hospice. An information folder has been produced and issued to all existing and new trustees, giving them information on their responsibilities as a Hospice trustee, background information on the Memorandum and Articles of Association, Financial Accounts, Business Plan and Contingency Plan.

Organisational Structure

The Hospice has a Board of trustees which currently comprises five members, with twelve being the maximum permitted under the Articles of Association. The trustees come from a variety of backgrounds, bringing an appropriate mix of clinical, professional and managerial skills and experience that enables them to contribute to the effective working of the Hospice. There are bi-monthly Board meetings to review operations and strategy, which are also attended by the Chief Executive. Sub-committees reporting to the Board have been established to deal with designated areas of trustee responsibility as follows:

- Integrated Governance Group Bi-monthly, between Board meetings, to review clinical and hospice governance, strategy and provide support for the senior team.
- The Finance and Audit Committee Bi-monthly, between Board meetings to review the financial performance of the organisation against financial budgets and forecasts, cash and reserves positions, fundraising strategy, staffing/HR issues, and all aspects of the administrative support functions.
- Remuneration Committee Meeting annually, to consider and make recommendations to the Board regarding staff remuneration packages.
- · Membership and terms of reference of committees are reviewed annually at the AGM.

The management team and Board of trustees work to appropriate Charity Commission and Companies House Codes of Conduct. Copies of Standing Order Financial Instructions have been issued to all members of the Board and a Policy folder is available to all relevant persons.

All trustees, staff, and volunteers are subject to Disclosure and Barring Service checks where appropriate, before taking up a post with the Hospice.

The Hospice is registered with the Care Quality Commission, Information Commissioners Office and holds a Small Society Lottery License with the local authority.

The Hospice operates a policy of equal opportunities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH NORTHUMBERLAND HOSPICE

I report on the financial statements of the Hospice for the year ended 31 March 2020, which are set out on pages 10 to 29.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Hospice's trustees, who are also the directors of The North Northumberland Hospice for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination being a qualified member of The Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- (i) examine the financial statements under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- to follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- (iii) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the financial statements presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the financial statements present a 'true and fair view'and the report is limited to those matters set out in the next statement.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The North Northumberland Hospice is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Greensfield House, Unit 3 Greensfield Industrial Estate, Willowburn Avenue, Alnwick, Northumberland, NE66 2DG.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Hospice's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Hospice is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Hospice. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Hospice has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Hospice is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Hospice has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Hospice has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is the amount derived from the provision of goods/services, stated after trade discounts, other sales taxes and VAT.

Investment income

Investment income, where appropriate, is included when receivable.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs incurred in connection with fund raising events.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the Hospice and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold Property

2% Straight Line

Leasehold Improvements

Straight Line over 25 year lease term

Computer Equipment

50% Straight Line

Fixtures & Fittings

10% Straight Line

Motor Vehicles

20% Straight Line

Office Equipment

20% Straight Line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Hospice reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The Hospice has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Hospice's balance sheet when the Hospice becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Hospice's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1 11 Taxation

The Hospice, being a registered charity, is not liable to UK income tax, corporation tax or capital gains tax as long as the income it receives is applied to charitable purposes. There are therefore no tax charges in the accounts.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Hospice's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
